

As Jeff was fond of saying in closing, "See you at the Rose". My only addition is "... and bring some friends!"



Meadowgrass - May 22-24 @ La Foret in Black Forest



While you'll see some drum sets and electric instruments at Meadowgrass this year, this year's line up in markedly acoustic. The festival, now in its 7th year offers an eclectic mix of local, regional and national acts with an amalgamation of musical genres that is sure to please anyone. The headliners this are Friday: Roosevelt Dime, Saturday: Blue Rodeo and Sunday: Stephen Kellogg.

Roosevelt Dime, named after the 10 cent coin, is a band that plays a mix of Americana, Folk and Roots Rock. Their press release describes their music as "Kings County Steamboat Soul" — a nod to the New Orleans music so integral to its sound, and a reference to the band's home base of Brooklyn.

Blue Rodeo, an alt-Country band, hails from Canada, where, in their 25 years together have released 13 albums, sold over 4 million records and won an unprecedented 11 Juno awards. You can expect a great show from this well-honed band.

Stephen Kellogg's music is a mixture of Americana, Country-Rock, Folk, Singer/Songwriter and, as he describes it in his bio, "somehow, pop." Also, known for his band Stephen Kellogg and the Sixers, Stephen works as a solo artist these days and is about to release his latest album, *South, West, North, East.*

Besides the headliners, there are a lot of excellent and interesting bands in this year's line-up. Some you may be familiar with and others are awaiting your discovery. That's the thing about music festivals; you're bound to discover something new that you'll like.

A couple of bands have a Black Rose connection. In October 2013, Trout Steak Revival put on a high energy show for us at the Black Forest Community Center. They are actually playing twice on Saturday at Meadowgrass so you have two opportunities not to miss them. Kelly Champlain has performed on the Black Rose stage many times since her teens. You may have seen her perform at the Black Rose with Adan Gardino. She's

been playing fiddle since she was a young girl and she's got a great voice too. She is now a member of the band Redraw The Farm. They'll be playing Friday at 2pm.

Some other bands you'll want to check out are the Shook Twins, Stray Birds, Front Country, White Water Ramble and The Ragbirds. Actually all the bands are worth a listen. Get a weekend pass so you don't miss any of them.

The Black Rose Acoustic Society will be selling discounted tickets to Meadowgrass at our May 8 show featuring Acoustic Eidolon. We'll also be at Meadowgrass this year so stop by our canopy in the vendor area and say hello.

Acoustic Eidolon May 8



Fate has a magical way of bringing people together. Take the case of Joe and Hannah, aka Acoustic Eidolon. In 1995, Hannah, a studio cellist, received a call to play on a Boulder ensemble's record. Hannah listened in amazement as directions to the recording studio told her to turn on a small road near her home, and then turn down her own street past her house!

Little did Hannah know that across the street and three houses away lived Joe, the greatest

double-neck guitjo player in the world (OK, the only doubleneck guitjo player in the world).

A few years after they met, Joe and Hannah both found themselves between full-time musical engagements. Joe called Hannah, saying he'd always wanted to hear the cello and the guitjo together. He had a feeling the harp-like sound of the guitjo, combined with the warmth of Hannah's cello, would be beautiful together. So on a snowy day in February 1998, they got together to play for the first time. What happened next was magic. Captivated by the music they created together, Joe and Hannah immediately agreed to clear out their schedules, start rehearsing full-time, and form what would become Acoustic Eidolon.

But, fate wasn't finished with Hannah and Joe. What started as a musical/business partnership and friendship blossomed into their marriage on October 14, 2001. Hannah and Joe (and sons Zach and Alex) became a family. Joe and Hannah joke that this was a marriage of convenience since they were already together all the time anyway! But, anyone watching them perform can participation. feel the love that draws them together. Their love for one another, and their passion for life, speaks through their music.

Kailin Yong June 12

The Kailin Yong Peace Project Trio, led by Singaporean violin The music of Jack Williams, rooted in his native South Carolivirtuoso Kailin Yong, brings its signature blend of world music to our stage in its continuing effort to promote peace, friendship, and cross-cultural understanding using the power of music

to bridge boundaries and bring people together. Joining Kailin are cello wizard James Hoskins and master world percussionist Brett Bowen.

Kailin has performed on our stage several times with both the Peace Project and the Boulder Acoustic Society. His musical biography is too long to list here, but here are some highlights: at age 13, he won his nation's National Music Competition and was "discovered" by a visiting professor from the Royal Academy of Music in the UK. Fast forward through 14 years of study, army, graduate study in Vienna, touring. He came to the



US in 1999 and made his first year's living playing in the San Francisco Bay Area BART (subway) stations while studying the jazz of Stephane Grappelli, the tango of Astor Piazzola and a host of other styles. In 2004, he was awarded the Daniel Pearl Memorial Violin at the Mark O'Connor Strings conference, he founded the groups Strings of Tao and the award-winning Boulder Acoustic Society, and for 2009-2010, he was an Artist in Residence for the city of Boulder.

The Kailin Yong Peace Project Trio explores the commonalities found in Chinese folk melodies, Baiao and Samba from Brazil, the Laz of the Turkish Rom, Argentine tangos, Arabic and Sufi microtonal mystique, American roots, odd and mixed metered Balkan and Greek dance madness, modern jazz ballads, and more, all mixed with a good dose of joy, humor, and audience

Join us on June 12 for a musical trip around the world.



na, was shaped by a 54-year career of playing folk, rock, jazz, R&B, classical and the popular music of the 30s, 40s and 50s. He is counted among the most dynamic performers on today's

"folk" circuit - "...one of the most enlightened and entertaining performers I've ever encountered", said Dave Humphreys of Two-Way Street Coffeehouse in Downer's Grove. IL. Jack is considered a "musician's musician", an uncommonly unique guitarist, a writer of vivid songs with a strong sense of place, and a storyteller in an old Southern tradition who further illustrates each tale with his guitar. Rich Warren of WFMT Chicago's The Midnight Special said, "His artist-



ry is nothing short of amazing". Vic Heyman, in SING OUT!, wrote, "He is one of the strongest guitar players in contemporary folk."

Avoiding the compromises of the commercial music industry Peter Yarrow (of Peter, Paul and Mary) called Jack "..the best during his 50+-year professional career, Jack prefers touring under the radar, playing concerts, large and small, week in and week out, from the sheer love of music and performing. Playing for more than 50 house concerts each year. Jack enjoys the intimacy of that venue most of all, with a more personal connection to his listeners. Jack is a sought-after artist on all contemporary acoustic music stages, from coffeehouses and festivals to music halls and city arts stages. From acclaimed appearances at the Newport, Boston, Philadelphia, Kerrville, New Bedford SummerFest Folk Festivals, his musicianship, songs, stories and commanding presence have established him as an uncommonly inspiring and influential performer.

Jack frequently shares his musical knowledge with others. In addition to leading numerous workshops as he tours the country, he has been on the staff of The Swannanoa Gathering in NC, Lamb's Songwriter Retreat in MI, The Folk Project in NJ, WUMB's Summer Acoustic Music Week in NH, and co-hosts a semi-annual Music Workshop Weekend near his home in the Ozarks.

Jack has nine CDs of original music on the Wind River (Folk Era) label, the newest being Four Good Days, plus his DVD High Cotton, a video collection of on-stage performances. An additional CD, Don't Let Go, is a collection of cover songs reflecting major influences on his musical development. Jack has produced all of his own recordings plus CDs by Mickey Newbury, Ronny Cox, Eric Schwartz, and others.

His songs have been recorded by artists ranging from Tom Jones and David Clayton-Thomas to Chuck Pyle, Cindy April 10 Open Stage performers, Nick Watras & Bill Elliott

Mangsen, Ronny Cox and Lowen & Navarro. In addition to his solo career, as a guitarist he has accompanied such luminaries as Tom Paxton, Peter Yarrow (of Peter, Paul & Mary), Mickey Newbury and Harry Nilsson.

Kevin Oliver of NO DEPRESSION magazine described Jack's music as "...a musical style that's equal parts folk storytelling and Tin Pan Allev songcraft, delivered with the impassioned soul of an old blues singer." Friendships with two great singers had an enormous impact on Jack's career and on the development of his own singing voice. In 1973, his relationship with the late Harry Nilsson resulted in an album effort at RCA during an ill-fated period of music industry turmoil. Until 2002, he sometimes toured as sole accompanist to his friend, the late Mickey Newbury, with whom he co-wrote, co-produced, and recorded a live album and video. Nights When I Am Sane (reissued as Winter Winds).

Mickey Newbury said, "Jack and his music are an American treasure" From 1958 through 1988, along with playing jazz (trumpet) and classical guitar, Jack was best known as an electric guitarist in a series of original rock bands and smaller acoustic ensembles. In the late 60's, he gave in to his troubadour nature and began performing solo - singing and playing a gutstring guitar and touring from coast to coast.

guitar player I've ever heard..." As a hired-gun guitarist in the Deep South of the Civil Rights-Easy Rider 60's, Jack's bands accompanied the likes of John Lee Hooker, Big Joe Turner, Jerry Butler, Hank Ballard, the Shirelles, and the Del-Vikings.


Jack Williams' music, enriched from these varied influences, is a truly an All-American Southern music.

Snyder Family Band Wherever I Wander Mountain Home Music Company




The Snyder Family Band from Lexington, North Carolina consists of Bud Snyder on upright bass supporting two of his kids playing fiddle and guitar. This trio has the dynamics, talent and power of similar trios like Nickel Creek. This album blew me away. Zed Snyder, at a mere 19, plays flatpick guitar with

the felicity and skill of some of the best guitarists in bluegrass. His younger sister Samantha, 16, began violin at age 3 and now plays with a subtlety that defies her age. This CD of five instrumentals and six vocal tunes is almost completely original music demonstrating that these siblings have a talent for writing to match their chops. "Nantucket's Sleigh Ride" and "The Peach Truck" are blistering instrumentals, while "Whenever I Wander" and "A Whaler's Song" highlight Samantha's vocals. Her voice is a work in progress, but is pleasant enough. I predict this band will go far.

The Roys The View Rural Rhythm Records 1120

Brother and Sister duo Lee and Elaine Roy have released The View on Rural Rhythm records and it's an outstanding bluegrass album. Raised in Canada, the siblings moved to Nashville seven years ago and have been an upward path to success ever since. They've won the Bluegrass Artist of the Year award at the International Acoustic



Music Awards, and Bluegrass Artist of the Year at the Inspirational Country Music Faith, Family & Country Awards for four Ragged Union consecutive years. What impressed me most about The View Hard Row to Hoe was the songwriting. "No More Lonely" is a hopeful song Shining Castle Music 1501 about finding love again after divorce. "Those Boots" is an all-American tribute to farmers, soldiers, and cowboys, with the Ragged Union played on the Black Forest Community Center

ture and conquering fears. It's a great driving bluegrass tune. "Mandolin Man," Lee's tribute to the father of bluegrass Bill Monroe, concludes this solid eleven-song collection. Lee Roy's voice reminds me a bit of Ricky Skaggs. Elaine's is somewhat like Claire Lynch's. Together they harmonize beautifully. Do yourself a favor and discover the Rovs.

Runa Current Affairs Runamusic.com



When I saw Runa in concert at Stargazers Theatre March 7 I was struck by a interesting few things about this Philadelphiabased Celtic band. First, the band has a percussionist playing a series of hand drums, cymbals and chimes, something I'd never seen in a Celtic band. Secondly, they have no

pennywhistle, flute or pipes player which is the norm for most Celtic bands. And thirdly, Philadelphia born Shannon Lambert-Ryan, the band's leader and vocalist has an uncanny ability to sing with an Irish accent. Overall, I enjoyed Runa's version of progressive yet traditional-sounding Irish music. The band's new release Current Affairs features thirteen tracks including interesting liner notes explaining their choice of these mostly traditional tunes. I liked "The Wife of Usher's Well" which tells the sorrowful tale of a woman who sends her three sons overseas to school only to learn that they have died just a month and a day later. The grieving mother is visited by the three sons in ghostly form to bid her farewell. "Henry Lee" is a ballad about a jilted-lover's revenge and features the jazzy, contemporary strumming of the band's guitarist Fionan de Barra. "The Ruthless Wife" is a song that vocalist Shannon wrote about her own great-great grandfather who was shot in the line of duty as a police officer in Philadelphia in 1922. Current Affairs includes a couple of instrumentals, an Irish lullaby, and several lovely ballads. This album has nice variety, lovely vocals, and pleasant musicianship. Young bands like Runa prove that traditional Celtic music continues to inspire a new generation of musicians.





Paul met a bunch of local players at the Colorado Roots Music Camp some years ago, and they've been getting together ever since to play standards and jazz tunes. They've formed several loose groups including Wednesdays on Wolfe, Hot Djam, Swing Noir and Hot Club of, well somewhere. There's also a downloadable collection of swing tunes at the Downloads site listed below. This will be lots of fun!

Hootenanny: These days we're using <u>Rise Up Singing</u>, the best jam songbook there is. About 1200 songs from hundreds of years and Broadway to the Beatles. Anyone who looks through this book winds up saying "HEY! We gotta do this song next!" We have plenty of copies, but you'll want your own shortly and they're available from *Sing Out!* Magazine; I highly recommend you get the large print leader's version at http:// singout.org/product/rise-up-singing-9x12-leaders-spiral-bound-edition/.

Radio Oldies: Larry Goodin leads this, and is one of our most popular jams. You don't need to be a great player, or even a player, period. It's just fun to come and sing along, too. His song compilation is available on the download page listed above.

Bluegrass jam: Dalton Maples has recently been leading several of these, and we're very appreciative! We're playing out of the Mel Bay Parking Lot Picker's Songbook, edited by Dix Bruce. We'll have copies to share, but you can also get your own ahead of time; it might be at your local music store, and it's available on the web. Besides being clearly notated and a great selection of songs, it includes two CDs where editor Dix Bruce and great banjoist Bill Evans run through a verse and chorus of every song, to give you an idea of how it sounds, or just to play along with for fun. This book is great, I highly recommend it.

Fiddle Tunes: This jam is <u>not</u> just for fiddles; it's for anyone who wants to play fun, traditional dance tunes such as "Soldier's Joy," "Old Joe Clark," etc. There are two downloadable files for this: one is the Fiddle Tune Jam compilation on the download page listed above. It has a good starter set of fiddle tunes, and on the main downloads page shown above, there's also a good set of downloadable recordings that you can play with. We've also been working from Dave Firestine's Carpilation book, which is (continued on page 12)
